The View from the Waves

There is perhaps no characteristic of our age more remarkable than this: never before has humanity possessed so much information, and never before has it appeared so uncertain. We can measure the stars, map the human genome, and communicate with strangers across the globe in an instant, yet we remain haunted by a peculiar uneasiness. We have become experts at predicting catastrophe and novices at cultivating hope. Our age is not distinguished by its doubts so much as by its anxieties. For it is a common misunderstanding to suppose that the opposite of faith is doubt. Doubt, after all, can sometimes be the servant of faith, compelling a man to search more deeply for the truth. The true enemy of faith is anxiety—that quiet tyranny which persuades the soul that the storm is more substantial than the One who commands it. No scene in Scripture illustrates this more vividly than Peter stepping onto the restless waters of Galilee. Peter remains one of the most consoling figures in the Gospel because he is gloriously, unmistakably human. The others remain safely in the boat, content to observe the miracle from a respectable distance. Peter alone is reckless enough to ask for the impossible: "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you." For several astonishing moments, the impossible becomes ordinary. Peter walks upon the sea because his attention is fixed upon Christ. Yet the Gospel tells us, with almost painful simplicity, *"When he saw the wind, he was afraid."* He did not sink because the waves suddenly grew larger, nor because the laws of nature abruptly remembered themselves. He sank because his vision changed. The storm ceased to be something around him and became the thing within him. This is the peculiar temptation of our own civilisation. We awaken each morning to headlines announcing war, economic uncertainty, political division, environmental crises, violence, loneliness, and the relentless demands of technology. Our devices have become windows through which every storm in the world enters our hearts. We are continually invited to contemplate the waves until they seem more real than God Himself. The devil rarely needs to persuade us that God does not exist; it is sufficient if he convinces us that our fears deserve more of our attention than our Creator. Whatever occupies the gaze eventually governs the heart. The soul becomes shaped by what it beholds. If it continually contemplates outrage, it becomes angry. If it dwells upon fear, it becomes fearful. If it worships success, it becomes restless. But if it looks steadily toward Christ, it gradually acquires His peace. The direction of our attention determines the direction of our lives. Perhaps this explains why the disciples first mistook Christ for a ghost. Anxiety distorts perception. When fear becomes habitual, even grace appears threatening. We become suspicious of hope itself. We imagine that salvation is an illusion because we have grown accustomed to expecting disaster. Yet the Gospel reaches its most beautiful moment precisely where Peter reaches his worst. As the water rises about him, Peter offers no polished theology, no carefully composed liturgy. He simply cries, "Lord, save me!" It is one of the shortest prayers ever uttered, and perhaps one of the greatest, because it is entirely honest. The remarkable detail is that Christ stretches out His hand immediately. The rescue precedes the rebuke. Divine mercy is swifter than divine correction. God is more eager to save than we are to ask. This is the great consolation for a generation weary from carrying burdens it was never meant to bear. Christ does not wait until Peter learns perfect faith before extending His hand. He rescues first, then teaches. Such is the order of grace. We are all, in one way or another, standing where Peter stood. The securities upon which previous generations relied seem increasingly fragile. Careers shift without warning, relationships fracture, institutions disappoint, and even our own hearts prove less dependable than we imagined. The boat itself no longer feels entirely secure. Yet the Gospel does not promise calm seas; it promises the presence of One who walks upon them. Faith, then, is not the absence of storms but the refusal to enthrone them. It is the deliberate choice to allow Christ, rather than fear, to occupy the centre of our vision. The waves may continue to rise, the winds may continue to howl, and our knees may still tremble. But so long as our **eyes remain** fixed upon the One who is Lord of both wind and sea, we discover that the greatest reality is not the storm beneath our feet but the hand already reaching toward us. And that hand, as Peter discovered, is never late.
