VANGELO **Mt 18,21-35**

In quel tempo, Pietro si avvicinò a Gesù e gli disse: «Signore, se il mio fratello commette colpe contro di me, quante volte dovrò perdonargli? Fino a sette volte?». E Gesù gli rispose: «Non ti dico fino a sette volte, ma fino a settanta volte sette. Per questo, il regno dei cieli è simile a un re che volle regolare i conti con i suoi servi. Aveva cominciato a regolare i conti, quando gli fu presentato un tale che gli doveva diecimila talenti. Poiché costui non era in grado di restituire, il padrone ordinò che fosse venduto lui con la moglie, i figli e quanto possedeva, e così saldasse il debito. Allora il servo, prostrato a terra, lo supplicava dicendo: “Abbi pazienza con me e ti restituirò ogni cosa”. Il padrone ebbe compassione di quel servo, lo lasciò andare e gli condonò il debito. Appena uscito, quel servo trovò uno dei suoi compagni, che gli doveva cento denari. Lo prese per il collo e lo soffocava, dicendo: “Restituisci quello che devi!”. Il suo compagno, prostrato a terra, lo pregava dicendo: “Abbi pazienza con me e ti restituirò”. Ma egli non volle, andò e lo fece gettare in prigione, fino a che non avesse pagato il debito. Visto quello che accadeva, i suoi compagni furono molto dispiaciuti e andarono a riferire al loro padrone tutto l’accaduto. Allora il padrone fece chiamare quell’uomo e gli disse: “Servo malvagio, io ti ho condonato tutto quel debito perché tu mi hai pregato. Non dovevi anche tu aver pietà del tuo compagno, così come io ho avuto pietà di te?”. Sdegnato, il padrone lo diede in mano agli aguzzini, finché non avesse restituito tutto il dovuto. PRIMEIRA LEITURA **Eclo 27,33-28,9**

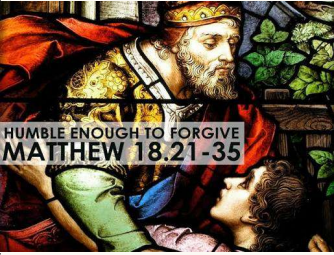

EVANGELHO **Mt 18, 21-35**
Naquele tempo, ²¹Pedro aproximou--se de Jesus e perguntou: “Senhor, quantas vezes devo perdoar, se meu irmão pecar contra mim? Até sete vezes?” ²²Jesus respondeu: “Não te digo até sete vezes, mas até setenta vezes sete. ²³Porque o Reino dos Céus é como um rei que resolveu acertar as contas com seus empregados. ²⁴Quando começou o acerto, levaram-lhe um que lhe devia uma enorme fortuna. ²⁵Como o empregado não tivesse com que pagar, o patrão mandou que fosse vendido como escravo, junto com a mulher e os filhos e tudo o que possuía, para que pagasse a dívida. ²⁶O empregado, porém, caiu aos pés do patrão e, prostrado, suplicava: ‘Dá-me um prazo; e eu te pagarei tudo!’ ²⁷Diante disso, o patrão teve compaixão, soltou o empregado e perdoou-lhe a dívida. ²⁸Ao sair dali, aquele empregado encontrou um dos seus companheiros que lhe devia apenas cem moedas. Ele o agarrou e começou a sufocá-lo, dizendo: ‘Paga o que me deves’. ²⁹O companheiro, caindo aos seus pés, suplicava: ‘Dá-me um prazo; e eu te pagarei!’ ³⁰Mas o empregado não quis saber disso. Saiu e mandou jogá-lo na prisão, até que pagasse o que devia. ³¹Vendo o que havia acontecido, os outros empregados ficaram muito tristes, procuraram o patrão e lhe contaram tudo. ³²Então o patrão mandou chamá-lo e lhe disse: ‘Empregado perverso, eu te perdoei toda a tua dívida, porque tu me suplicaste. ³³Não devias tu também, ter compaixão do teu companheiro, como eu tive compaixão de ti?’ ³⁴O patrão indignou-se e mandou entregar aquele empregado aos torturadores, até que pagasse toda a sua dívida. ³⁵É assim que o meu Pai que está nos céus fará convosco, se cada um não perdoar de coração ao seu irmão!”! –

GOSPEL **Matthew 18:21-35**

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times. 'And so the kingdom of Heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. "Give me time," he said,

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“and I will pay the whole sum. "And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me." He said. His fellow-servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow-servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him, "You wicked servant,” he said “I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow-servant just as I had pity on you?" And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.' **The Gospel of the Lord** **All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ**

Matthew 18:21–35

“Everyone thinks forgiveness is a lovely idea until he has something to forgive.” (I personally like this phrase...it is so telling) The passage begins with Peter asking Jesus how often he must forgive another—perhaps imagining that even forgiveness ought to have a reasonable limit. Jesus’ answer destroys this calculation. Forgiveness, in the Christian life, cannot be reduced to keeping accounts. Everyone thinks forgiveness is a lovely idea until he has something to forgive. This is precisely the difficulty exposed by Jesus’ parable. It is easy to admire forgiveness when the debt belongs to another. It is quite another thing when someone has wounded our pride, betrayed our trust, or treated us unjustly. Then forgiveness ceases to be an attractive principle and becomes a costly act of the will. The servant in the parable has been forgiven an immeasurable debt, yet he refuses to forgive the small debt of his fellow servant. His tragedy is not merely that he is cruel. It is that he has forgotten what he himself has received. He has accepted mercy as a fact but has not allowed mercy to change him. Here the vision of grace becomes especially significant. We often encounter grace not as something comfortable, but as something that tears through our illusions. Grace exposes pride and reveals the sinner to himself. In this sense, forgiveness is not sentimental. It is a kind of death to the self that insists upon being the creditor. To be a Christian means to forgive the inexcusable, because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you. The Christian forgives NOT BECAUSE THE WRONG WAS INSIGNIFICANT, but because the Christian has discovered that he, too, stands entirely dependent upon mercy. Perhaps this is why our understanding of grace can feel so severe. Grace does not simply make us feel better about ourselves. It makes us honest. It removes the comfortable distinction between “the sinner” and “me.” Matthew 18 therefore asks more than whether I can forgive another person. It asks whether I have truly understood the mercy by which I live. Forgiveness, then, is the evidence that grace has moved from the mind into the heart. We forgive because we have first been forgiven.
